COLLAPSING BANK/CAR PARK RISK ON DAWSON MEMORIAL FIELD

Over the last 18 months Council has been monitoring a bank slippage below the lower car park. The monitoring has been undertaken by a professional company. A pathway also sits on the top of the slippage to the bowls club, tennis club and areas beyond. The pathway has been unusable in parts for some time.

During this severe spring weather (mostly heavy rain) the bank has slid a further unexpected considerable distance and Council has been forced to close the footpath and the immediate area completely for safety reasons to protect the public. During this time a mains electricity cable has also been severed. Clearly, there is a risk that the bank may collapse completely. Council is also concerned about the longer term stability of the car park area above the path and the slippage, which clearly needs to be stabilised and the relative issues resolved.

Council is in the process of consulting with civil engineers as to the way ahead. However the issue is resolved, it is likely to be expensive. Until Council has recommendations from the engineers it is impossible to have any idea of costs and any wider implications. Parish Council has to seriously consider the recommendations and the wider financial commitments in order to determine the degree of work to be done. Council does not have unlimited funds so will need to consider how the work will be paid for. Reviews will be taken of Council's financial position.

Once these decisions have been made, as mentioned at the Annual Parish Meeting it is still highly likely that we will need to borrow money from the 'Public Works Board', a government department which helps small councils with large expense projects at really good rates of interest. The Sports and Social Centre was part funded through this route.

This project is likely to take a considerable amount of time to resolve including formal tendering processes once plans etc. are agreed and drawn up.

Council will keep you informed of progress in minutes, on Facebook and the website.

FAREWELL TO DANBURY

This will be my final article for the Danbury Times, as I am retiring at the end of July, and I have decided to reflect on my time here together with the Parish Council achievements.

I commenced my role as Parish Clerk on the 1st May, 2005 and have worked for the Parish Council for the last thirteen years. When I joined, the Parish Office was situated in part of the current tennis pavilion and all the meetings were also held in that small area. It was remarkable how the staff and councillors managed.

In the early years the village won the Best Kept Village category for a large village obtaining prize money and bronze plaques for 2007 and 2008 which are installed in the current Parish Office.

Progression was all important bringing the Parish Council into the 21st century. The major project was to drain the football pitches and resurface the car parks and install lighting. Grant funding was all important to achieve the project which was successfully completed in 2010.

The greatest advancement was the move of the Parish Council to the Old School House. As everyone should know the Parish Council is now situated in the old school building. This provided a much larger worker space with a separate meeting room and office. This made it a great deal easier to hold working party meetings during the daytime.

Danbury was chosen as a pilot for the new Quality Gold Award and after considerable work became the first Parish Council in the country to achieve this accolade of which I am extremely proud. Danbury has been lucky enough to have an active Neighbourhood Plan Group which is progressing well with the Neighbourhood Plan document for the village. This will be used by Chelmsford City Council as statutory planning guidance.

Legislation is constantly changing and as clerk you must keep up to date by attending and completing training courses earning valid Continuing Professional Development points. You must then implement and progress the updates.

The Old Pavilion was refurbished and brought back into use and is now booked out on a regular basis.

The Sports and Social Centre building has undergone renovation with complete electrical refurbishment. New toilets provided throughout the building, which were installed with the aid of a Lottery Grant.

The largest project going forward is the prevention of further land slippage on Dawson Memorial Field. This will be one of the greatest challenges for the new clerk going forward.

I have always enjoyed the challenge of arriving at work and never knowing what the emergency will be for that day. The unexpected can alter your work schedule at a moment's notice. Your knowledge has to be extremely wide: hosting meetings, working in partnership with local clubs who use the Parish Council's facilities, completing all aspects of finance from budgeting, precept, through to invoicing, answering residents' queries and offering advice. These are but a few of the duties.

I wish Danbury and your new clerk Michelle Harper all the very best for the future and I am sure the Parish Council will go from strength to strength. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank all residents, councillors and staff who have helped me in my role for the past thirteen years.

New hedgerows boost Danbury's rich wildlife

Hundreds of volunteers and numerous organisations have worked together to plant more than a kilometre of native hedgerow this winter.

Danbury Ridge Living Landscape is home to many species of wildlife, including adorable Hazel dormice, shy Brown hares and beautiful Yellowhammers, but continued fragmentation of their habitat here and elsewhere in Essex means they need our help. Wildlife needs to move to survive – to find food and shelter, to breed and to escape threats. Planting hedgerows helps them to do this.

So, over the winter 7,000 native species saplings, covering close to 1,500 metres, were planted across private land in the Danbury Ridge Living Landscape area, by Living Landscape volunteers, staff from Essex Highways, Ground Control Limited and the Environment Agency. Their hard work will help recreate lost wildlife corridors and reconnect isolated woodlands, allowing wildlife to disperse safely.

The project, led by Essex Wildlife Trust is part of an ongoing collaboration between a variety of organisations, including

Little Baddow Conservation Society, National Trust, various parish councils including Danbury and Little Baddow, Chelmsford City Council and Essex County Council through the Living Landscapes initiative.

"We are absolutely delighted with this winter's results, which were made possible by the support of volunteers and staff from a multitude of organisations, as well as those who provided financial support," Emma Ormond, Essex Wildlife Trust's Living Landscapes coordinator, says.

"Planting has now ceased as we head towards the warmer months, but plans are already afoot to identify further areas to plant our next 'kilometre for wildlife' within this fabulous Living Landscape".

Butterflies have long been one of the most celebrated features of the UK's wildlife. Bright and attractive these eye catching creatures take us back to our childhoods and spending summers outdoors in nature. Sadly, three quarters of British butterfly species are now in decline and a number have already declined to such an extent that they are no longer seen in Britain.

This decline is worrying as a healthy population of butterflies may indicate the general good health of an environment. To address this, one of the aims of the Danbury Ridge Living Landscapes partnership (DRLL) initiative (led by the Essex Wildlife Trust) is to restore, recreate and reconnect natural habitats so that butterflies and other wildlife can thrive. A team of volunteers have recently planted hedges in and around Danbury, providing natural corridors linking existing habitats.

What can you do to help?

Why not choose some butterfly friendly plants for your garden, leave a hedge rather than replace with a fence or wall, leave an area of your lawn unmown so that wildflowers can grow through or plant some wildflower seeds in an unused space.

DRLL with the help of local residents, is completing its annual survey of butterfly species sightings. 

The Magic "RE"

REDUCE don't buy goods wrapped in plastic, use paper bags (mushroom bags are good) for vegetables and

fruit, take your own shopping bag for loose vegetables, shoes, clothing directly, always have your

own shopping bags to avoid buying another (keep them in the car boot).

REUSE keep any plastic bags/plantpots/seed trays to use until they fall apart! Then see Recycle below.

REPLACE think whether there is an alternative to plastic – e.g. coir seed and plant pots, canvas shoppers,

biodegradable rubbish bags.

REFUSE take out goods (e.g. carrots) from plastic packaging at the till and leave it with the cashier – a smile and explanation usually works; don't double wrap meat already plastic packaged, use your own bags

for shoes/clothing instead of becoming a walking advert for the shop/chain with their plastic bags.

RECYCLE use the recycling system – the cover poster suggests some perhaps unexpected items which can be

rinsed in your washing up water and recycled rather than putting them in the black bin for landfill.

Do remove triggers and pump dispensers and put in the black bin though.

REWARD Give yourself a gold star if you manage a way to cut your plastics use!

REMINDER We are all aware of the increasing problems with plastic packaging: floating islands of plastic rubbish at sea and lots washed up on every beach; birds, fish and animals suffocated by plastic rubbish; microscopic plastic beads in our drinking water and perhaps in our food. Do ask what your favourite shops are doing about it. If you aren't satisfied, shop elsewhere. A few people can make a difference because the protests will spread. A little helps -recycling one bleach bottle saves enough energy to

power a street light for over 6 hours.
